I. INTRODUCTION

The Animal Welfare Board of India was set up in 1962 in accordance with Section 4 of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, 1960 (No. 59 of 1960). The Board consists of 28 Members including four Members of the Lok Sabha, two Members of the Rajya Sabha, four Government of India officials, three Members who have been actively engaged in Animal Welfare work one Member each from the Indian Board for Wildlife and Indian Veterinary Association, one representative each from Practitioners of Modern and Indigenous Systems of Medicine, two representatives of Municipal Corporation, One representative each of three SPCAs, three voluntary Animal Welfare Organisations and three individuals nominated by the Govt. of India. The Board is reconstituted once in three years.

The well known humanitarian Smt. Rukmini Devi Arundale was the Founder Chairman of the Board. She held office till her demise in February, 1986 except for a brief spell of four years. During this period, Dr. Y. Prasad, Animal Husbandry Commissioner, Shri M.K. Dalvi, Inspector General of Forests and Dr. O.N. Singh, Animal Husbandry Commissioner held the office of Chairman. Shri M.C. Daga, M.P., was the Chairman from July, 1986 to February, 1987. Thereafter, Dr. A.K. Chatterjee, Animal Husbandry Commissioner to the Govt. of India and Prof. N.S. Ramaswamy, President, CARTMAN and Shri Panna Lall Mundra held the office of the Chairman for brief periods before the present Chairman Lt. Gen (Retd.) A.K. Chatterjee, PVSM, VSM, ADC assumed office with effect from 18.3.92.

The Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, 1960 (59 of 1960) was enacted in December, 1960 with the object of preventing infliction of unnecessary pain and suffering to animals. The Govt. of India, Ministry of Food and Agriculture, constituted the Animal Welfare Board of India on 19th March, 1962. The Act was amended in July, 1982. The subject of Prevention of Creutly to Animals was transferred from Ministry of Argiculture to the Ministry of Environment and Forests with effect from 28.3.1990.

FUNCTIONS OF THE BOARD


- (a) To keep the law in force in India for the Prevention of Curelty to Animals under constant study and to advise Government on the amendments to be undertaken in any such law from time to time.
- (b) To advise the Central Government on making of rules under this Act with a view to preventing unnecessary pain or suffering to animals generally, and more particularly when they are being transported from one place to another or when they are used as performing animals or when they are kept in captivity or confinement;
- (c) To advise the Government or any local authority or other person on improvements in the design of vehicles so as to lessen the burden on draught animals;
- (d) To take all such steps as the Board may think fit for amelioration of animals by encouraging, or providing for, the construction of sheds, water-troughs and the like and by providing veterinary assistance to animals;

- (e) To advise the Government or any local authority or other person in the design of slaughter-houses or the maintenance of slaughter-house or in connection with slaughter of animals so that unnecessary pain or suffering, whether physical or mental, is eliminated in the pre-slaughter stages as far as possible, and animals are killed, wherever necessary, in as humane a manner as possible;
- (f) To take all such steps as the Board may think fit to ensure that unwanted animals are destroyed by local authorities, whenever it is necessary to do so, either instantaneously or after being rendered insensible to pain or suffering;
- (g) To encourage, by the grant of financial assistance or otherwise, "the formation or establishement of Pinjrapoles, rescue homes, animal shelters, sanctuaries and the like" where animals and birds may find a shelter when they have become old and useless or when they need protection;
- (h) To co-operate with, and co-ordinate the work of, associations or bodies established for the purpose of preventing unnecessary pain or suffering to animals or for the protection of animals and birds;
- (i) To give financial assistance and other assistance to Animal Welfare Organisations functioning in any local area or to encourage the formation of Animal Welfare Organisations in any local area which shall work under the general supervision and guidance of the Board.
- (j) To advise the Government on matters relating to the medical care and attention which may be provided in animal hospitals and to give financial and other assistance to Animal Hospitals whenever the board thinks it necessary to do so;
- (k) To impart education in relation to the humane treatment of animals and to encourage the formation of public opinion against the infliction of unnecessary pain or suffering to animals and promotion of animal welfare by means of lectures, books, posters, cinematographic exhibitions and the like;
- (I) To advise the Government on any matter connected with Animal Welfare or the prevention of infliction of unnecessary pain or suffering on animals.

III. FUNDS

Under the Act, the funds of the Board are made up of grants allotted to it by the Central Government, State Governments, contributions, donations, subscriptions, bequests, gifts and the like. The Board being a Central Government body, the sole contributor of funds is the Govt. of India. It has also received donations in cash both in India and from abroad.

During the year 1992-93, Rs. 99,60, 293-00 was received by the Board both under Plan and Non-Plan accounts as grant-in-aid from the Central Government. The donations received during the year amounted to Rs. 34,003-00. The list of donations may be seen in **Annexure - A.**






SCHEMEWISE ALLOCATION OF GRANTS TO


No funds have been released to organisations who have not settled previous year's accounts.

Government of India grant received by the Board during the year was Rs. 99.60 lakhs. Grants released by the board was Rs. 70.78 lakhs. Percentage wise it work out to 71.07% of the grant received by the Board from Central Government.



Two year Roll-on Plan:

While considering sanction of financial assistance to Animal Welfare organisations, the Board took note of the point that certain schemes like construction of animal shelters/rescue homes need more than one year's time for completion and larger grant-in-aid. For meeting such needs, a two year Roll-on Plan was approved. Under this, Societies/Animal Welfare Organisations which are doing good work and are prompt in settling accounts would be given a sizeable lump sum grant in the beginning of the financial year itself to be utilised in two year time. In the second year, such Animal Welfare Organisations get only a small grant for Establishment and cost of medicines.

VI. MOBILE ANIMAL CLINIC/FIRST-AID CENTRE

A Pilot project of the Board is the operation of the Mobile Animal Clinic in the Headquarters of the board at Madras. The Mobile Animal Clinic under the charge of the Hony. Vety. Surgeon of the Board goes to different localities in the city of Madras where animal habitations are concentrated, to treat animals free of charge on-the-spot during forenoons as per a fixed programme. The First-aid-Centre is functioning in the premises of the Board in the afternoons from 2.30 p.m. to 5.30 p.m to give free treatment to sick and injured animals. During the year 2800 cases were treated in the Mobile Animal Clinic Programme and 2206 animals in the First-aid-Centre of the Board.



Animals cannot go to hospital. Hence Mobile Clinics must go to Animals The Board's Veterinary Surgeon providing on-the-spot treatment for animals.

VII. HUMANE EDUCATION

One of the main functions of the Board is propagation of humane education to educate people particularly the children to avoid cruelties to animals and to inculcate in their minds the need to be kind and compassionate towards animals.

1. "Animal Citizen"

The Official organ of the Board "Animal Citizen" was revived and four issues of the journal were brought out during the year 1992-93. The subscription rates were revised. The present rates are: Single copy Rs. 4/- Annual subscripton Rs. 16/- and for 5 years Rs. 60/-. Foreign subscription \$8.

A two minute film titled 'Tongawala' was produced. The Board also acquired a film on cruelty to animals which are for exhibition by Doordarshan and are being used as course material in the training courses on Animal Welfare.

Due to the keen interest shown by our organisations and animal lovers, the Board's publicity material could reach various educational insittutions in different parts of the country rallies, conferences, fairs, hospitals and so on.

iv) Press Meets

Press meets were held on various occassions presided over by the Chairman. Particular reference may be made in respect of the Press meets at Madras, Calcutta, Bombay, Delhi and Hyderabad during the year. In addition, 80 Press meets were held at different parts of the country in connection with the training course programmes. The Press was very responsive and encouraging the activities of the Board thereby creating awareness among the general public.

v) TV Programmes

The Delhi Doordarshan Telecast, a discussion on Animal Welfare by Chairman of the Animal Welfare Board and Shri S.C. Dey, Additional I.G. of Forests in the Network Programme. The Madras Doordarshan Kendra telecast "focus" aprogramme in which Shri K. Babu the Officiting Secretary, Animal Welfare Board of India and Director of Animal Husbandry, Government of Tamilnadu participated. Smt. Priya Sundaram, Humane Education Officer of the Board participated in the "Aspiration" (programme for the youth) of the Madras Doordarshan Kendra.

VIII. OBSERVANCE OF ANIMAL WELFARE FORTNIGHT COMMENCING FROM 14TH JANUARY, 1993

The Animal Welfare Fortnight was inaugurated by the President of India, Dr. Shankar Dayal Sharma, who released the sale of Mercy Stamps on 14th January, 1993.

A nine member delegation led by the Lt.Gen.(Retd.)A.K. Chatterjee, Chairman, Animal Welfare Board of India, called on the President, Dr. Shankar Dayal Sharma at Rashtrapati Bhavan, New Delhi, on 14th January, 1993 on the eve of Animal Welfare Fortnight. The main thrust of Animal Welfare Fortnight Observance was to arouse the attention of people on the need for showing compassion and concern to animals and to shower succour and relief to them.

ALL INDIA PHOTOGRAPHIC AND SLOGAN COMPETITION

The Board organised All India Photographic and Slogan Competition in connection with the Animal Welfare Fortnight during January, 1993 on the themes of kindness to animals including birds and all living creatures and prevention of cruelty to animals. The response to the competition was very good. Panel of judges selected the entries for the competitions.

ABC Project

The Board launched a drive to popularise ABC Programme. The ABC Programme was inaugurated at the Madras SPCA on 14th January, 1993. The Director of Animal Husbandry, Govt. of Tamilnadu was requested to render technical assistance and infrasturcture to conduct the ABC operations at the Government Veterinary Hospitals all over Tamilnadu for getting dogs/cats operated. The programme was conducted with the active involvement of SPCAs and Animal Welfare Organisations, who collected the stray animals for the ABC operations project.

This drive will be extended to other States in a phased manner.

IX. ANIMAL WELFARE TRAINING COURSES

The Animal Welfare Training Courses were conducted in collaboration with Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animal (RSPCA), UK.

The main objectives of the training courses were as follows:-

- 1. To create an awareness among the general public in the country.
- 2. To involve the police, Corporation officials, Veterinarians, Teachers, Lawyers, Journalists and other Animal Welfare activists for promoting the cause of Animal Welfare and prevention of cruelty to animals.
- 3. To establish more Animal Welfare Organisations in different parts of the country especially where such organisations are needed.

X. ANIMAL WELFARE FORTNIGHT OBSERVANCE BY ANIMAL WELFARE ORGANISATIONS AND SPCAs

The Animal Welfare Fortnight was celebrated as usual throughout the country from 14th January, 1993. The co-operation of the SPCAs and Animal Welfare Organisations and other institutions in celebrating the Fortnight with great enthusiasm had consistently been significant. The Fortnight observance aimed at arousing the Animal Welfare consciousness among the public and involve more and more people in the noble cause.

In connection with the celebration of Animal Welfare Fortnight, the Board issued a circular letter to all Animal Welfare Organisations/SPCAs, Government Institutions etc., to observe the Fortnight from 14th January, 1993 in a befitting manner.

Animal Health Camps and Programmes were held by various organizations/SPCAs to extend the Veterinary help to a large number of animals living in remote villages. Painting/Drawing Competitions, animal-quiz programmes, dramas and plays were organized to generate awareness among the public. Some of the organisations reported the manner in which they celebrated the Fortnight.

Blue Cross of Hyderabad:



S.P.C.A. Kakinada, conducted a meeting on 19.1.93 at the Lions Club Hall. Dr. R. Mohan Rao, Joint Director (Animal husbandry) spoke at length the theme of animal welfare. At a Dog show held at the Exhibition Grounds, the Revenue Divisional Officer, Shri D.C. Bhimanaik gave away prizes to as many as 24 entries. The Rolling Shield introduced this year was bagged by "Vikky" of Shri N. Chandra Shekar.

Mayuri Kindness Club, Prathipadu, Andhra Pradesh:

The Mayuri Kindness Club of Minerva Public School, Prathipadu (A.P) celebrated the Fortnight by way of conducting Quiz-contest and Essay competition. Some pet animals like rabbits, ducks, parrots etc., were brought and reared. Sick animals were given first-aid treatment. an elocution test was held at Smt. P.S.Municipal Girls High School, Kakinada, and prizes given to the winners.

Shri Krishna Goshale Samithi, Ambala Dt. Haryana:

Intensive propaganda campaigns were launched by Shree Krishna Goshale Samithi, Yamkeshwar Tirth (Dist. Ambala) during the Fortnight. Programmes for the school children were organised and a cattle exhibition held.

Bangalore SPCA, Karnataka:

Bangalore SPCA conducted humane education course for school teachers at Sacred Heart Teachers Training College at Bangalore. Animal Health Campaign was conducted at Kolar District. Exhibitions were conducted at St. Joseph Indian High School where a dog show was also held. Free veterinary programme was held at Yadavani in Tumkur District co-sponsored by Syndicate Bank. Kindness Club Meeting and exhibition were held at Seshire Home, Bangalore. A number of health clinics, free veterinary programmes and feeding up of animals were arranged.

Mysore Pinjrapole Society Mysore:

An award titled "Prani Mitra of Mysore Pinjrapole Society" was given away to Shri K.S.Mandeger, Joint Director, Karnataka Police Academy, Mysore for his meritorious services in rescuing and taking steps to stop illegal slaughter of animals. The award presentation function was arrnaged in January, 1993 during the Animal Welfare Fortnight.

The Joint Director, Animal Husbandry at Kurnool issued circular requesting to display posters and distribute pamphlets and leaflets on animal welfare, to arrange meetings in schools and colleges, to conduct essay writing and such other competitions for schools and colleges, to organise Kindness Clubs in schools and colleges, to conduct animal health campaign, feeding of stray animals first aid to sick and injured animals and also to celebrate Animal Welfare Fortnight from 14th January, 1993 in a fitting manner.

Palghat SPCA:

Seminar, Essay and painting competitions, exhibition of paintings and quiz competitions were conducted during Animal Welfare Fortnight.

Krishi Goseva Sangh, Malegaon, Maharashtra:

The Secretary of Krishi Goseva Sangh, Malegaon, Dr. Satish K.Gujarathi has sent us a report on the Fortnight Celebrations by the Sangh. Camps for free treatment of animals were organised at Malegaon and adjoining villages in which more than 200 cases were attended to. In a Seminar held at Soundane village, speakers dwelt on the need for animal welfare. Adequate media coverage was given to these functions.

Nagpur SPCA

The Nagpur Society distributed pamphlets, booklets and displayed posters on animal welfare during the Fortnight.

Bombay SPCA:

Bombay SPCA observed the Animal Welfare Fortnight from 15th to 27th February, 1993. Public meetings were arranged, pamphlets and booklets were distributed and training camps were organised and veterinary care for animals was rendered. Injured and sick animals were treated. Sterilisation camps were conducted.

Jodhpur SPCA, Rajasthan:

Dr.P.M. Kumbhat, Vice - President of the Jodhpur SPCA, has sent us a detailed report about the Fortnight celebrations. To create awareness among the masses, banners were displayed at vantage points of the city, posters pasted on the walls, mercy stamps sold and slides screened in the cinema halls. In addition video-cassette "Beauty Without Cruelty" was shown to a large number of children in schools and colleges. All India Radio Jodhpur, broadcast a talk on animal welfare by Shri C.M. Chordia, the treasurer of the SPCA on 14th January, 1993. A calf-rally was organised with the co-operation of Animal Husbandry Department on 22nd January, 1993. Prizes to best crossbred animals were awarded. Seven animal treatment camps were held during the Fortnight in which 244 animals were given treatment-30 operated, 24 castraed, 170 vaccinated and medicines given to 471 animals.

Valedictory funnction was held on 28th January, 1993 at Information Centre. Justice Rajendra Saxena of the Rajasthan High Court was the Chief Guest and Shri Girish Dave, Deputy Commissionner, Incometax presided over the function.

Shri Madnesh Goshala, Madanganj, Rajasthan:

They distributed pamphlets and publicity material in all panchayat centres. Posters were displayed at important places. Free veterinary camps were arranged for treatment of animals.

Amritsar Pinjrapole Goshala:

This Goshala celebrated the Fortnight for the protection of animals. They displayed posters and distributed the pamphlets on the theme of the animal welfare.

SPCA Ambala:

SPCA Ambala arranged poster/painting competitionns and banners were displayed and pamphlets distributed to the public. Rallies were arranged for school students.

Salem SPCA:

They observed the Fortnight to create an awareness among the young and old and educated and uneducated in the villages and towns to be kind to animals. Posters were displayed. Pamphlets were distributed. Competitions were conducted, slides were exhibited, free feeding for Animals was conducted. Mercy stamps were sold. Meetings were arranged. Free treatment to sick and injured Animals was arranged. Film shows were also conducted.

SPCA Trichirapalli:

Trichy SPCA arranged kindness clubs meetings at schools and colleges and conducted essay, oratorical competitions for school children.

Pondicherry SPCA:

Conducted competitions among the schools and colleges to mark the celebration of the Animal Welfare Fortnight on the topics "Role of Animals in Environmental Protection"

Delhi Pinjrapole Society:

This Society organised meetings in which local M.P., M.C.D. Councilor and Member of the Metropolitan Council of Delhi addressed the gathering Lt. Governor of Union Territory Delhi, Director of Publicity, Delhi Administration were requested to issue an appeal in the local language to the people of Delhi for supporting the cause of animal welfare.

Shri Digamber Jain Balbodhini Sabha, Saharanpur, U.P.:

Shri.Digamber Jain Balbodhinic Sabha, Saharanpur observed the Fortnight in a befitting manner. Feeding the stray animals, Animal Show, on-the-spot painting competition for school children, elocution contests, Essay Competition and Animal Welfare camps were some of the highlights of the celebrations.

Animal Welfare Fortnight was observed by the Andaman & Nicobar Administration in a fitting manner. A training programme was arranged. Kindness Clubs were started. Posters were displayed. Pamphlets and booklets were distributed. Programmes were arranged in All India Radio.

XI CRUELTY CASES

The Board received a number of complaints about infliction of cruelty to animals. Immediately the concerned authorities were requested to take steps to prevent such incidents. The details are given below:



Cattle In the drought hit areas of Gujarat

Illegal trade in birds and animals:

It was reported that illegal trade in restricted species of birds such as Lal Munia, Alexandrian parakeet, mynas, bul-bul, owls,, horn bulls, magpies, Himalayan monals, ringneck parakeet, giant-squirrels, star tortoises, turtles, all kinds of deer (black buck, spotted deer etc) was being carried on. It was reported that more than 100 traders operated from different place such as, Jhansi, Burdwan, Calcutta, Pune, Indore and other places. Bombay Crawford Market reportedly has 18 shops for dealing in wild animals and birds. On receipt of this report the Board took up the matter with the Government of Maharshtra, Bihar, U.P. and West Bengal to take discrete action to nab the unscrupulous traders in restricted species of birds and animals.

Cruelty in cattle Shandy:

It was reported in the month of April 1992 that the limbs of cattle are broken at Pamidi and Boranta villages in Anantapur district in Andhra Pradesh. The Deputy Inspector General of Police at Anantapur District was requested to book the offenders so that such instances may not recur again. We are glad to place on record the immediate action taken by Shri P. Venkaiah, I.P.S., Deputy Inspector General of Police, Anantapur District for taking suitable action to pab the offenders. The Superintendent of Police Shri K.V. Reddy of Ananthapur District has taken all possible steps to prevent the breaking of limbs of animals being broken at shandies of Pamidy, Gorantala of Anantapur District.

Illegal Slaughter:

It was reported that cows, calves and other useful cattle were being slaughtered at Mulkapuram of Visakhapatnam city. The Commissioner of Police, Visakhapatnam was requested to issue necessary instruction to stop such illegal slaughter as the same were violating the P.C.A. Act, 1960 and Animal Preservation Act of Andhra Pradesh.

Practical Steps to reduce cruelty:

The Board has approached the Central Institute of Agricultural Engineering, Bhopal for suitable designs of Harnesses and Yokes which will reduce pain for the draught animals. They have informed us that such designs/harnesses are available with them.

Further, the following institutions are engaged in the designing of suitable harnesses for animals.

a) Bullocks

- 1) Central Institute of Agricultural Engineering, Bhopal.
- 2) Allahabad Agricultural Institute.
- 3) Punjab Agricultural University, Ludhiana.
- 4) Institute of Agricultural Engineering, Raichur.
- 5) Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Rewari.

b) Buffaloes

Pantnagar University of Agriculture and Technology.

c) Camel

- 1) College of Technology and Agricultural Engineering Jaipur.
- 2) Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Rewari.

d) Donkeys

- 1) College of Technology and Agricultural Engineering, Udaipur.
- 2) Institute of Agricultural Engineering, Raichur.

Campaigns for popularising these modified designs should be launched so that the sufferings of draught animals are reduced.

Deonar Abattoir Improvement:

On the topic of "Slaughter of Animals" the poor conditions of Deonar Abattoir was highlighted by the Press in July 1992. Numerous Animal Lovers also expressed their concern on this subject.

The Chairman Animal Welfare Board of India took up the matter with the Municipal Commissioner of Bombay Municipal Corporation. The Municipal Corporation of Bombay held meetings with the concerned authorities and the following decisions were taken:-

- a) The Transport Commissioner is to enforce the provisions of P.C.A. Act 1960 and Rules thereunder in respect of animals brought to Bombay from villagers within Mahrashtra State. Similarly the provisions of Motor Vehicles Act, 1988 and Rules thereunder are also to be enforced.
- b) The Director of Animal Husbandry to ensure that necessary certificates are to be issued after examining the animals carefully at the loading point to ensure that the animals are in a fit condition to undertake journey. It is also to be ensured that the animals brought to abattoir are taken by hand cart whenever necessary.
- c) The general information regarding the guidelines for testing the fitness or otherwise for slaughter of animals should be exhibited at a conspicuous place as required.
- d) The SPCA at Bombay be invited as a special Invitee for supervising the working of the legal cell.
- e) The SPCA be requested to depute its inspectors at the Deonar Abattoir to ensure that there is no violation of provisions of the P.C.A. Act.
- f) A Member of the Animal Wefare Board of India be invitied to visit Deonar Abattoir and see whether the provisions of the P.C.A. Act are suitably enforced.
- g) Measures to ensure prevention of cruelty to animals in the pre slaughter stages at the Deonar Abattoir be examined.

Shri S.K. Sagani, Additional Municipal Commissioner of Bombay Municipal Corporation in his letter dated 30th July, 1993 assured the Board that suitable action will be taken by the Bombay Municipal Corporation to ensure implementation of the decisions on the subject of slaughter of animals at Deonar Abattoir.

Ox-Races:

It was reported that Ox races were organised on a large scale at Ponnur from 29th March to 20th April, 1993. The Board requested the Superintendent of Police, Guntur District to take necessary action to book the offenders since the Ox races were already banned by the Andhra Pradesh Government. Similar action was taken to inform the Superintendent of Police of Krishna District to stop the Ox races at Vakkangarh village where Ox races were to be held from 15th to 20th May, 1992.

Reports were received about the ox races in Cuddapah district of Andhra Pradesh during December 1992. The superintendent of Police of Cuddapah District was requested to prevent the ox races as they were offences under P.C.A. Act and were banned by the Government of Andhra Pradesh.

Cock-fights:

Reports were received by the Board that cock fights were to be conducted in a number of places in Andhra Pradesh especially in Visakhapatnam District. The District Collector, and Superintendent of Police, Visakhapatnam were requested to stop the cock fights since such sports are offences under the P.C.A. Act, 1960.

Similar reports were received about cock fights which were to be held during October, 1992 in Guntur Distirct. The Board requested Shri R.P. Meenaji, Superintendent of Police of Guntur District to issue strict instructions to the concerned authorities to take stringent action on the offenders.

XII ANIMAL SACRIFICES

The Animals and Birds Sacrifices Prohibition Acts are enacted in the States of Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Tamilnadu, Kerala and Gujarat. The Board has been pursuing with other States to make similar legislation for prohibiting killing of animals in the name of religion. During the year under report the Board's attention was drawn to several instances in animal sacrifices even in the States where the legislation is in force. The reports received by the Board and the action taken for prohibiting the sacrifices of animals have been tabulated and the details are in the tabulated statement.

Incident of Animal Sacrifice

1. Sacrifice of Animals. He Buffalow, Sheep and fowls at Komaravolu village of Relugunta Mandal. Visakhapatnam Dt. in connection with the Kamalamma Jatra from 4-5 to 14.5.92.

- 2. Sacrifice of animals & birds in so many villages at Chittoor in connection with the Ganga Jatra from 12.5 to 19.5.92.
- 3. Sacrifice of animals at Madugula in connection with the Modakandamma festival during May '92.
- 4. Sacrifice of animals at Pedavulavalpadu of kanigiri in connection with the Paleliganga Jatra from 18.5 to 20.5.92.
- 5. Sacrifice of animals and fowls near Shivapuram of Vinukonda Police Station in Guntur Dt. in connection with the Patharattamma Festival from 17.5. to 20.5.92.
- 6. Huge Sacrifice of animals & fowls at Madugula in connection with Madakondama Festival from 2.6. to 5.6.92.

Action taken by the Board

Express Telegrams issued to the Sub-Collector, Dy. Superintendent of Police, The Mandal Revenue Office, Narasipatnam Visakhapatnam Dt. & (This) Sub-Inspector of Police Rolugunta requesting them to prevent the sacrifice of animals & report to the Board the action taken.

We requested the collector & the Supdt. of Police Chittoor, to issue necessary instructions to prevent the sacrifice, and requested to send the report of action taken.

We requested the Sub-Collector, Narasipatnam and Dy. Supdt. of Police, Anakapalli to issues necessary instructions to prevent the sacrifice & requested to sent the report of action taken.

The Collector & the Superintendent of Police Ongole were requested to take appropriate action to prevent such sacrifice and requested to kindly intimate the action taken.

The Superintendent of Police, Guntur and the inspector of Police, Vinukonda, were requested to take immediate action to stop wuch sacrifice & recuested to send the report of action taken.

Express Telegram issued the Dt. Collector and the Superintendent of Police Visakhapatnam Dt. to take immediate action to stop such sacrifice & requested to send the report and sent letters to Mandal Revenue Officer, & Sub. Inspector of Police Madugula, Visakhapatnam Dt. to take necessary actions.

XIII MISCELLANEOUS

Amendment to Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, 1960:

The Board has been considering the amendments to the P.C.A. Act, 1960 to make the Act more stringent and upto date in relation to existing conditions. After thorough study the Board's recommendations of necessary amendments to the P.C.A. Act have been forwarded to Ministry of Environment and Forests.

Computer Software to eliminate dissection:

A scheme of Coputer software which has been designed by an expert was considered by the Board. If this form of teaching could be popularised, the biology students in schools and colleges can dissect frogs, rabbits and rats and such other animals on computer monitor itself. This would avoid dissection of live animals by the students. The advantage of this scheme will be that live animals need not be dissected and frogs which are now being dissected will help the farmers in controlling pests. The project can be taken up through NCERT and the CBSE. The Committe for the Purpose of Controlling and Supervising Experiments on Animals can also take necessary action for implementing this project.

Revival of Committee for the Purpose of Controlling and Supervising Experiments on Animals:

The Committee for the Purpose of Controlling and Supervising Experiments on Animals which was wound up in 1976 has been revived and reconstituted. The Committee has already held three meetings. On 26th Feb 91, 16th April 91 and 7th Oct 92. The Board released a sum of Rs.2 lakhs for carrying on their activities during the year 1992-93.

State Animal Welfare Boards:

Since long, the Board had been requesting all State Governments to establish State level Animal Welfare Boards. So far, the following States/Union Territories have constituted such Boards 1. Andhra Pradesh, 2. Gujarat, 3. Maharastra, 4. Madhya Pradesh, 5. Pondicherry, 6. Orissa, 7. Rajasthan, 8. Tamilnadu, 9. Manipur, 10. Mizoram, 11. Andaman Nicobar Islands, 12. Himachal Pradesh, 13. Arunachal Pradesh.

7. Sacrifice of animals (Hundreds of Goats) to the Deity Muneceswaran at Trichy Dt. on 13.8.92.

Express telegrams were sent to the Dt. Collector & the Superintendent of Police. Trichy Dt. to take action against the culprit & requested to issue necessary instructions to the concerned authorities so that it will not recur again. We are glad to note that the Supdt. of Police, Trichy in his letter dt.5.11.92 assured that such occurences would not happen in future.

8. Sacrifice of animals & Birds in Hindu Temples during festival months in Cuddalore & Vellore.

The Dt. Collector, & the superientendent of Police, Vellore N.A. District, The Dt. Collector & the Supdt. of Police S.A. Dt. Cuddalore were requested to take appropriate action & the Vellore SPCA, and the Cuddalore SPCA were requested to take necessary action to stop the sacrifices and also requested to send the report of action taken.

9. Sacrifice of animals the Angala Perameswari Amman Temple at Melmalayanur, Senchi To., S.A. Dt. from 19.2 to 1.3.93.

Express telegram were issued to the Dt. Collector & the Supdt. of Police, Melmalauanur, Sanchi, SA Dt. to take action to prohibit the sacrifice.

10. Sacrifice of animals at Arewadi village in Sargali Dt. maharashtra during the festival times.

We requested the collector & the Supdt. of Police Sangli Dt. M.S. to stop the sacrifices.

11. Sacrifice of animals (Goats & Fowls) in several villages in Visakhapatnam Dt. in connection with the Nookalamma jatra festival from 21.3. to 24.3.93.

The Dt. Collector & The Supdt. of Police Visakhapatnam Dt. were requested to take appropriate stops to stop the sacrifices.

12. Sacrifices of animals at Gadderalla Devanakonda Police Station in connection with the Maremma Jatra in first or 2nd week of March 93 and at Nandavaram, Chowdeswari jatra from 26.3 to 29.3.93 and Maddulatiswami temple of Betam Cherla Police Station on every Saturday & at Venkaiahpatti of Kurnool, (Rural) Police station on every Sundary & Firday.

The Dt. Collector & the Superintendent of Police, Kurnool Dt. were requested to take immediate action to stop such sacrifices & also take stringent action against the offenders.

13. Sacrifice of animals (Goats) at Janapadn of Nereccherla Mandalam on every Friday during festival time.

The Dt. Collector Nalgonda & The Inspector General of Police, Hyderabad Range, Hyderabad were requested to prevent the sacrifice & also take stringent action against the offenders.

14. Sacrifice of animals (Goats) at Gottipadu, forests area of Dornals Mandalam on Katammaraju Festival in 24.3. & 25.3.93.

TheDt. Collector & the Superintendent of Polic were requested to take immediate steps to stop such sacrifices & requested to send the report.

Revival of Organisations:

We have succeeded in reviving/starting three NGOs in Tamilnadu, viz., S.P.C.A. Mannargudi, Krishna Venkatesan Animal Welfare Trust Madras, and Madras Snake Park, one in Kerala viz., SPCA Thiruvananthapuram one in Uttar Pradesh viz, Agra SPCA two in Maharashtra viz., SPCA Nagpur, and All India Animal Welfare Association, Bombay.

A very old organisation with considerable assets viz. the All Lovers of Animals Society Calcutta has been shut down by Calcutta High Court Orders. The organisation is presently dormant. The Board has requested the Minister of Animal Husbandry Govt. of West Bengal to intervene to resolve the problems.

Appointment of Honorary Animal Welfare Officers:


During the year, 966 Honorary Animal Welfare Officers/"Jiva Sarathi" were appointed to work for this cause and mitigate the suffering of animals.

In addition, the Chairman visited the Animal Welfare Organisations in the States of Maharahstra, Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, West Bengal, Delhi, Andhra Pradesh, Tamilnadu and Pondicherry. The Member of the Board Dr.S. Abdul Rehman visited Kerala and Karnataka. Shri M K Dev Verma Assam and Delhi; Mrs. Usha Sharma, Madhya Pradesh and Delhi and Dr. R.P. Barahate, Maharashtra.




Chairman and the Vice Chairman of the Board visited the drought affected areas in Gujarat

The officers of the Board and the Trainers of the Animal Welfare training courses covered all the States in the country except Jammu & Kashmit, Sikkim, Goa, Punjab and Arunachal Pradesh. These tours helped the Board to get acquainted with the needs of the Animal Welfare Organistions and their specific problems as also to ensure that the organisations are functioning effectively and the grants of the Board were utilised by them for the purpose for which they were sanctioned.



The Animal Welfare Board of India has completed 31 years of service in the country for the promotion of Animal Welfare and prevention of cruelty to animals. The Board has been striving to propagate kindness to animals. During the year under report the activities of the Board extended all over the country including those place which were not covered earlier. This was possible due to increased grants allocation by the Central Government. The training courses conducted in various parts of the country with the support of RSPCA (UK) was yet another landmark and this helped the Board to extend the activities in different parts of the country. The Nodal officers and the Animal Husbandry Department helped the Board in coordinating the activities of the Board even in remote parts of the country.

Almost the entire country was covered by the tours of Chairman, Vice Chairman, Members of the Board and the Officers and the Trainers. The Animal Welfare Organisations recognised by the Board were activated and the training courses were instrumental in propagating humane education in a big way. The trainees who had "undergone the 5 day training courses have all been appointed as "Jiva Sarathi" Honorary Animal Welfare Officers and this has given a boost to the activities of the Board.

The representatives of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, World Society for the Protection of Animals and Director of Animal Welfare in Edinburgh University visted the Board to extend their help and co-operation to undertake Animal Welfare activities in India.

The Tamilnadu Government has allotted the land measuring 3100 sq.mts. However the negotiations are on for allotment of land at concessional rate.

With the increased allocation of financial grants the Animal Welfare activities have been increasing. We have no doubt that with increase in grants in the years to come the activities of the Board are bound to be more effective and the dumb friends of man the animals would get their due share.
